Introduction

- Labour shortages are occurring in many sectors in Canada and globally and are on the rise.
- Alberta Occupational Outlook forecasts a labour shortage in Alberta of more than 45,000 workers by 2030.
- Construction trades continue to be identified as an area where labour shortages are forecasted to occur.



Introduction

- The Government of Alberta provides students with exposure to apprenticeship opportunities at an early age in order to:
 - Increase understanding of educational pathways that can support a transition from high school to apprenticeship education and beyond.
 - Raise awareness of the career opportunities that apprenticeships and the skilled trades can offer.



Exposure and Awareness



Raising Awareness

- Connections with K-12 teachers with trade-focused lessons, activities, videos, guest speakers and field experiences that align with math and science curriculum.
- Supporting junior high school student learning experiences that enable students to explore careers and apprenticeships.



Raising Awareness

- Providing both in-person and virtual presentations that can be tailored to specific class and lesson plans.
- Staging the Skills Alberta competition.
- Enabling students to test-drive careers and new skills through try-a-trade and skill exploration programs.
- Having a presence in Alberta schools, job fairs, and exploration events.



Opportunities for Education and Experience



Components of K-12 Career Education

- Career and Technology Foundations (CTF)
- Career and Technology Studies (CTS)
- Career and Life Management (CALM)
- Dual credit
- Off-campus education



Dual Credit Programs

- Optional career based high-school programming where Grade 10-12 students can earn credits toward:
 - High school diploma or certificate of achievement
 - A post-secondary certificate, diploma or degree
 - First-period apprenticeship or journeyperson certificate
- Student can use dual credit programs to gain advanced standing in apprenticeships, both through off-campus work experience or classroom instruction.

Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP)

- Students can work in a trade and earn wages, high school credits, and on-the-job hours towards their apprenticeship education program.
- Approx. 1,100 RAP apprentices as of Dec 31, 2022.
- Since RAP began, close to 6,600 apprentices have continued their apprenticeship program and are now certified tradespeople.



Career and Technology Studies (CTS)

- Students can complete apprenticeship classroom instruction while in high school, earning advanced standing in an apprenticeship program.
- 23 CTS Apprenticeship Pathways such as baker, carpenter, electrician, hairstylist, parts technician and welder.
- All required courses must be taught by a certified journeyperson for that trade.



Career Education Task Force

- Established in July 2022 to review career education for grades 7-12 in Alberta.
- Comprised of members from the K-12 education system, industry and post-secondary institutions.
- Heard from over 4,700 Albertans through a variety of public engagement mechanisms, including surveys and focus groups.

Task Force Report

- Provided strategic advice and recommendations to strengthen connections between schools and jobs.
- Final report submitted to Minister of Education in April 2023.
- Report contained 21 recommendations across 4 themes
 - 1. Career Education Programming
 - 2. Resources for Career Education
 - 3. Equitable Financial Resources for Career Education
 - 4. Collaboration Between Education Partners

Recommendation Implementation

Government committed to implementing 5 recommendations:

- 1. Increasing ease of access to off-campus education for all students
- 2. Reviewing dual credit programming to remove barriers
- 3. Developing and funding teacher training opportunities
- 4. Developing and promoting career education scholarships for students
- Enhancing how career education programming is measured and evaluated

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Financial Supports for Youth

Alberta High School Apprenticeship Scholarship Program

- Recognizes accomplishments of high school students participating in the Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP) and/or the Careers and Technology Studies (CTS).
- High School Apprentice Scholarship (\$1,000)
- High School Apprentice Scholarship Bright Futures (\$2,000)



Financial Supports for Employers

- Canada Apprenticeship Job Creation Tax Benefit
 - Employers can claim a tax credit equal to 10% of wages payable to eligible apprentices.
- Youth Internship Incentive Program
 - Offered by CAREERS: The Next Generation
 - Financial incentive for employers of youth in work integrated learning internships.

- Hire a high school student as an apprentice.

- Participate in school-led career fairs.
- Get involved in the Skills Canada Alberta movement.
