Alberta Board of Skilled Trades Updates

In fall 2022, the Alberta Board of Skilled Trades (ABST) formed <u>three standing committees</u>, which have been meeting regularly to carry out the board's legislated functions and ensure that the board meets its mandate.

Read more about the work of each standing committee below!

Board Operations Standing Committee (BOSC)

The BOSC's purpose is to:

- Ensure that ABST operations are effective,
- Address promotional opportunities for the ABST and skilled trades in general, and
- Develop operational, promotional, and strategic plans for the board.

Key priorities include:

- Developing and implementing ABST effectiveness and board competency measures;
- Creating an ABST Strategic Plan and Annual Business Plan/Priorities to be released in late 2023; and
- Diversity and Inclusion work as it relates to skilled trades professions in Alberta.

Industry Network Standing Committee (INSC)

The INSC is responsible to:

- Establish and maintain the Board's industry advisory mechanism, and
- Consult with industry on issues related to the skilled trades professions in Alberta that <u>fall under the</u> Board's mandate.

Key priorities include:

- Prioritizing industry issues for board action,
- Engaging with industry and stakeholders to address outstanding and new certification and restricted activity issues in the trades, and
- Launching the Board's industry engagement structure (planned for Fall 2023), which will leverage
 best practices for industry consultation, ensure sustainability of the model, and set up a system to
 effectively process matters brought to the board.

Industry Standard Standing Committee (ISSC)

The ISSC is responsible for reviewing industry recommendations, in advance of them being brought to the board, related to:

- trade designations,
- certification standards,
- scope of profession,
- restricted activities, and
- classes of individuals for designated trades.

The ISSC's role is also to:

- Review applications for the designation of new trades,
- Review the viability of existing designated trades as requested by the Administrator,
- Make recommendations for continuing or rescinding a designation,
- Review other industry qualification programs and out-of-province journeyperson certification to determine recommendations for recognition, and
